

Frequently Asked Questions

Who is Eligible to Participate?

♦ Children and adolescents between the ages of 8 and 17 with autism spectrum disorder and who are considered "high functioning" (specifically Asperger's syndrome, High Functioning Autism, or Pervasive Developmental Disorder - Not Otherwise Specified) .

What Does Participation Involve?

- Participation will involve either one or two sessions. Some participants will participate for approximately 1 hour while others participate for 3-4 hours. Parents and teachers will also be asked to complete questionnaires regarding the child participant.
- All child participants will receive a \$25 gift card (e.g., Chapters, Cineplex Odeon, etc.), and parents and teachers will each receive a \$10 gift card.
- Participation will occur at the University of Calgary and will involve completion of simple tasks related to bullying (peer victimization), social skills, and emotional abilities. Drinks, snacks & free parking are provided.
- Appointments will be arranged at a convenient time for participants, including weekdays, weekends, and evenings. A research assistant will be pleased to assist you find your way to our lab.

Peer Victimization in Students with High Functioning Autism Spectrum Disorder: A Research Project





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What challenges do students with High Functioning Autism Spectrum Disorder (HFASD) face?

- Difficulties in social interaction and communication.
- Repetitive patterns of behaviours, interests, & activities.
- Current research has shown that students with HFASD experience high rates of bulling/peer victimization.
- Bullying has been shown to lead to many negative outcomes for the victims, such as mental and physical health issues and poor academic achievement.
- Our research group is interested in examining the incidence, form, and impact of bullying among students with HFASD.
- The primary goal of this research project is to gain a deeper understanding of the specific risk factors related to bullying (peer victimization) in students aged 8-17 with HFASD.
- We believe that is it important to study risk factors for peer victimization in a high risk population to improve our knowledge of bullying in the general population and result in enhanced developmental outcomes for all students.

Research Objectives

- 1) What is the incidence of different forms of bullying in students with HFASD?
- 2) Does the form of bullying differ as a function of age?
- 3) How do parent and teacher reports of bullying of HFASD students compare to student report?
- 4) Do cognitive and/or social abilities influence risk for peer victimization in students with HFASD?
- 5) Does social cognition influence the risk for bullying in students with HFASD?
- 6) Do these social cognitive abilities interact and/or compensate for each other in terms of risk for peer bullying in students with HFASD?

Additional Information:

- Participants in this study include children and adolescents, aged 8-17, with a high functioning autism spectrum disorder, their parent(s)/guardian(s), and a teacher.
- Parents/guardians will provide valuable information regarding their child's/ adolescent's social and emotional characteristics. Parental involvement will require approximately 60 minutes.
- We anticipate that your participation in this research project will provide a better understanding and inform interventions and policies for students with HFASD.
